Wolfgang Aulitzky, MD is the Medical Director of the American Austrian Foundation. He is Associate Dean for International Medicine and Distance Learning, Adjunct Prof. of Clinical Urology and Adjunct Prof. of Clinical Reproductive Medicine at the Weill Medical College of Cornell University/New York Presbyterian Hospital. In 2016, he was appointed Adjunct Professor of Pediatrics in the Associated Faculty of the Perelman School of Medicine at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. He is also Associate Prof. of Urology at the Medical University of Innsbruck and Visiting Professor at the Medical University of Vienna. Amongst others he is a member of the American, German and Austrian Societies of Urology and was awarded the Zuckerkandlpreis of the Austrian Society of Urology in 1989. In 1995 he received the Silver Medal, in 2007 the Golden Medal for Merits to the Republic of Austria and in 2014 the cross of honor of the Land Salzburg. As Director of the Medical Program of the American Austrian Foundation he has initiated the Open Medical Institute, a scientific and educational collaboration of Weill Cornell and the NewYork Presbyterian Hospital, the Children Hospital of Philadelphia, Duke University, Columbia University, the Cleveland Clinic and leading hospitals in Austria. Dr. Aulitzky earned his medical degree at the University of Innsbruck in 1977, was a research associate at the University of Uppsala, Sweden and the Rockefeller University, New York. He received his training as an urologist at the University of Innsbruck and the General Hospital of Salzburg. He is the author of more than 140 publications on Urology, Andrology and Health Care issues and is co-author of books on basic and clinical urology/andrology.

William P. Tew, MD is a medical oncologist who specializes in the management of gynecologic malignancies and developed a unique research niche in geriatric oncology. He grew up on Long Island in New York and completed his undergraduate studies at Boston University in Biomedical Engineering. He graduated from University of Rochester School of Medicine and completed his medicine training at New York University and Bellevue Medical Center. He served as a research fellow at the American Federation for Aging Research at Harvard University. He completed fellowship training in medical oncology in 2005 at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center (MSK). Dr. Tew is currently an Attending and the Clinical Director of the Gynecologic Medical Oncology Service at MSK and Professor of Medicine at the Weill Cornell Medical College. His research interests revolve around two main areas: (1) novel therapies in ovarian cancer with a focus on anti-angiogenic and targeted therapies with correlative translational endpoints, and (2) development of geriatric assessment tools with a direct application for older women with gynecologic cancer. He has published over 100 peerreviewed articles. He is a reviewer of several major oncology journals and is the Associate Editor for the Journal of Geriatric Oncology. He is an active member of the NRG-GOG cooperative group (Gynecologic, Health Disparities and Patient Centered Outcomes Research). He has key roles at the American Society of Clinical Oncology (ASCO) including the advancement of their Geriatric Oncology initiatives and Clinical Guidelines (PARP inhibitors, Geriatric Assessment, NACT Ovarian Cancer). He is also graduate of the ASCO Leadership Development Program. Dr. Tew's research efforts have earned him grants from the NCCN, Seaver and Hennessy Foundations. He lives in the Upper West Side of New York City and enjoys travelling, bicycle riding, photography and a diverse range of music.

Dr. Zivanovic was born in Germany and grew up in Saarland, a southwestern German state bordered by France and Luxembourg. He graduated from Johannes Gutenberg University School of Medicine in Mainz and completed his Obstetrics and Gynecology residency at the Rheinische Friedrich-Wilhelms-University in Bonn, Germany. His fellowship training in Gynecologic Oncology was at the Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center, New York. Dr. Zivanovic is the Institutional Principle Investigator for Gynecologic Oncology Group (GOG) Partners and NRG Oncology and the Director of Innovative Surgical Technology at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center. Dr. Zivanovic's research interests include the role of cytoreductive surgery in patients with ovarian cancer, the role of hyperthermic intraoperative chemotherapy in peritoneal surface malignancies, the development of prognostic models for patients with uterine leiomyosarcoma and patient-reported outcomes in patients undergoing Gynecologic cancer surgery. He is the author and co-author of multiple peer reviewed publications in relevant Journals such as Gynecologic Oncology, Cancer, and Journal of Clinical Oncology. Dr. Zivanovic is currently on the faculty of Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center and Associate Professor of the Weill Cornell Medicine and New York Hospital. 

Monday, October 3, 2022

Being accepted to the OMI seminar was something that I had been looking forward to, especially since this particular seminar was held at my home institution. Gynecologic Cancers are among the most prevalent neoplasms in the Mexican population. Their adequate treatment is essential for survival and the choice of treatment can dictate their quality of life. I knew that a seminar focused on this topic would have a huge impact on my decision making in clinical oncology. Upon arrival to the first day of the seminar, we were handed a schedule for the activities which would take place during the next three days, a name tag, as well as a booklet which had all the presentations we would see in the seminar, which helped us be able to focus on the presentations and take notes if needed. I was seated in the front row and was handed my pre-seminar test to evaluate the knowledge I had on gynecologic cancers before the seminar. We would later do the same test to see how much we have improved. Next to me were two older physicians from the Medical Institution for Social Services (IMSS) who were very nice and asked me about my oncology fellowship. I soon found out I was speaking to the director of oncology at the IMSS! Where else would I have that opportunity?! The first lecture was given by one of the co-course directors, Dr. Oliver Zivanovic, regarding clinical trials and designs. As a research-oriented physician, I was especially keen to consolidate knowledge on this subject. An interesting question emerged, on if there is statistical significance which does not correlate with clinical significance, generated a stimulating argument. We then submerged into endometrial cancer, starting with the surgical management, proceeding with adjuvant radiation, and ending with adjuvant chemotherapy and medical management for recurrence. As a medical oncologist, I was particularly interested in the last talk. Carboplatin and paclitaxel had been the standard chemotherapy used for decades. New therapies with tyrosine kinase inhibitors and immunotherapy combinations are here to change the way we see oncology. At the end of the day, we had a workshop on fellows' case presentations. From a mucosal melanoma of the clitoris to fertility sparing in ovarian cancer, presentations were diverse and

the discussion was interesting. Even though we are all from Mexico, its impressive how there are so many disparities in health care. Institutions which have no radiotherapy department must make the best use of what they have at hand. Often, brachytherapy is not even available in radiotherapy centers.

Tuesday, October 4, 2022

On the second day of the seminar, we arrived for an early breakfast and a meeting with the faculty. We sat at a rectangular table so everyone could introduce themselves, and we discovered we were quite a heterogeneous audience. There were doctors from Cuba, Nicaragua, and all over Mexico, including Ensenada, Baja California, Hermosillo, and Tabasco. Disciplines were also varied: medical oncologists, gynecological oncologists, oncologic surgeons, and radiotherapists were among the group. It was also interesting to hear a bit about the faculty, something I believe was able to bring us together and maybe even open a door for future collaborations. The lectures throughout the second day were on vulvar and cervical cancer. The latter is very prevalent in Mexico, but is not as commonly seen in private practice, as early-stage cancer is treated mainly by gynecologists. Personally, I have never seen vulvar cancer or had a patient who has this disease, but learning about it was interesting and would contribute to my overall oncologic knowledge. Similar to the previous day, we started with surgical management, continued with radiotherapy, and ended with medical management. There were many new things that I learned in the presentations today. After the lectures, we followed with the second set of fellows' case presentations. I was among the presenters for this series, with a case presentation on fallopian tube cancer. Although it is treated similarly to ovarian cancer, there were some aspects of this case, such as a HRD (homologous recombination deficiency) without a BRCA mutation which was given olaparib (PARP inhibitor) treatment.

Wednesday, October 5, 2022

The third day happened quickly, as it was only a half day and entirely focused on ovarian cancer. Quite the opposite to the previous day, I see a lot of ovarian cancer at my institution, so we're used to discussing complicated cases and evaluating for HRD and BRCA. Surgery is an essential aspect of this complex disease, and medical oncologists must know several key aspects within proper staging to give our patients the best multidisciplinary treatment and have the best possible results in terms of response and survival. Another key aspect in clinical oncology, aside from classic chemotherapy, are antiangiogenics and PARP inhibitors, which are now used as maintenance therapy. Although not available throughout Mexico, we must strive to apply the standard of care we have learned from the presentations in this seminar and the experience of the faculty at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center to ensure better care for our patients.
